REDWOOD CITY OPERATES AS A CHARTER CITY UNDER ARTICLE XI OF THE CALIFORNIA STATE CONSTITUTION. REDWOOD CITY'S CHARTER PROVIDES FOR A COUNCIL-MANAGER FORM OF GOVERNMENT, WHICH CLEARLY DISTINGUISHES THE LEGISLATIVE POWERS OF THE CITY COUNCIL FROM THE ADMINISTRATIVE POWERS OF THE CITY MANAGER. GENERAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION IS CONSOLIDATED WITH THE SCHOOL DISTRICT IN NOVEMBER OF ODD NUMBERED YEARS.

CITY COUNCIL

The City Council consists of seven members, elected by the voters of the City to staggered terms of four years each. Members receive \$750 per month compensation.

The City Council meets regularly on the second and fourth Mondays of each month, and may call additional special sessions.

Section 10 of the Charter provides that "all powers granted to and vested in Redwood City by law or provisions of this Charter shall, except as herein otherwise provided be exercised by the Council, to be designated the 'Council of Redwood City'. The Council shall be the governing body of the City and, subject to the express limitations of this Charter, shall be vested with all the powers necessary or convenient for a complete and adequate system of municipal government, consistent with the constitution of the State, including all powers now or hereafter granted by general law to councils or boards of trustees of municipalities."

The City Council is the only body elected directly by the residents of Redwood City. As the legislative branch of the government, it makes final decisions on all major city matters. The Council adopts ordinances and resolutions necessary for efficient governmental operations, approves the budget, and acts as a board of appeals. It appoints the City Manager, City Attorney, and City Clerk and also the members of the City's boards, committees and commissions.

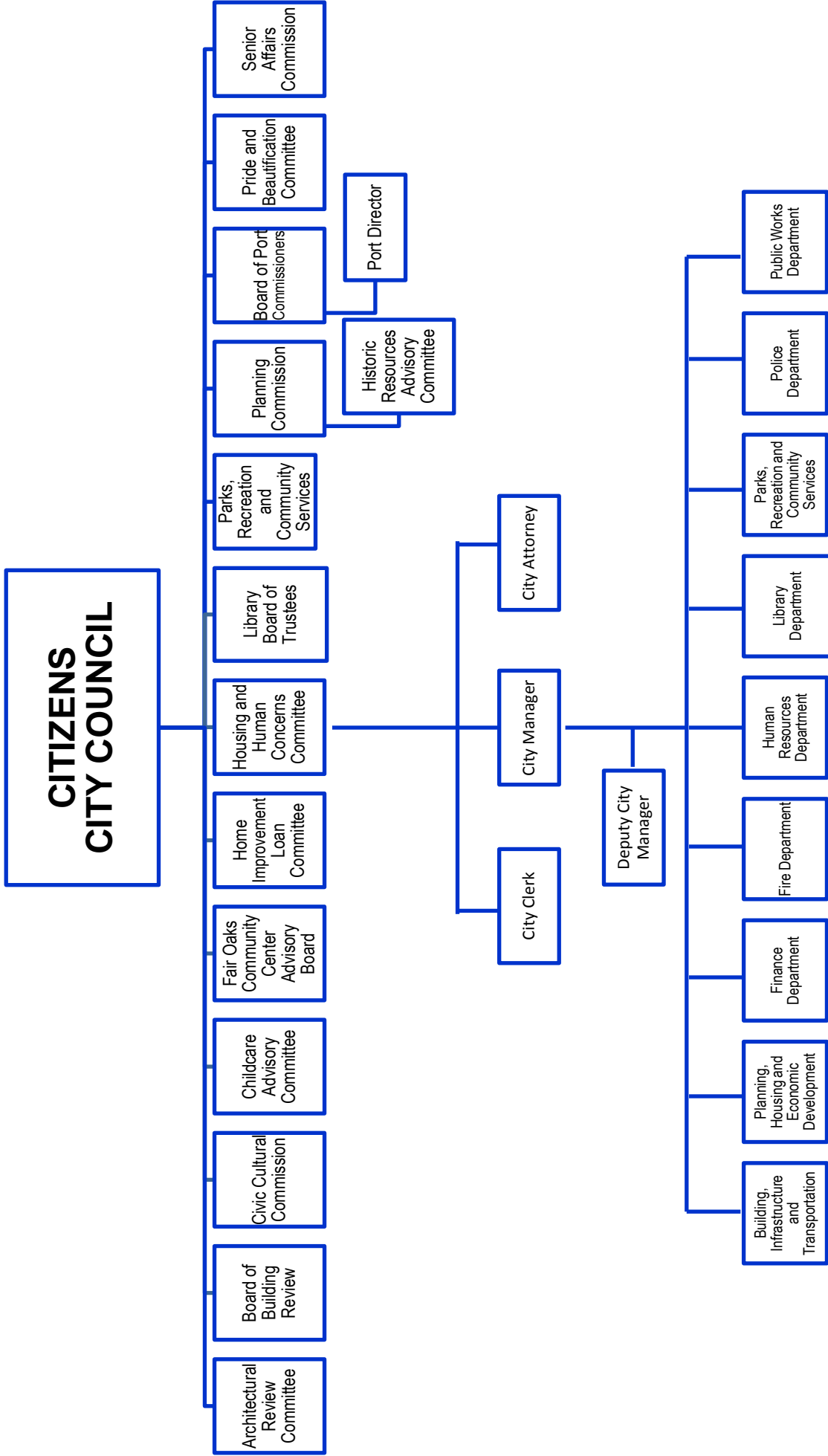

ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW COMMITTEE

The Architectural Review Committee was established by Resolution No. 11497 to provide enhancement of the natural beauty of the environment, and to provide for the orderly and harmonious appearance of structures and grounds in furtherance of the purpose of Article 45 of Ordinance No. 1130, as amended, the Redwood City Zoning Ordinance. Resolution 12977 revised the terms of Committee members to commence and expire May 31, of even numbered years.

The Committee shall advise the City Council, Planning Commission, and Zoning Administrator on matters concerning building and landscape architecture, site design, and signs. Specifically, the Committee shall:

1. Review the Redwood City Urban Design Guidelines and make recommendations.
2. Review applications for architectural permits pertaining to single family and multi-family dwellings, signs, landscaping, commercial and industrial buildings, and make recommendations.
3. Make recommendations regarding architectural aspects of both private and public projects of an unusual or controversial nature.
4. Make recommendations regarding architectural issues raised on appeal to the City Council in connection with the issuance or denial of entitlements or other project approvals or denials.
5. Provide such other recommendations pertaining to architectural matters regarding private and public projects in the City of Redwood City as deemed appropriate.

The Architectural Advisory Committee of the City of Redwood City consists of five members. At least three licensed architects or landscape architects residing or working in the City of Redwood City, or its sphere of influence (as described by and in the General Plan of the City of Redwood City) and the remaining members of the Committee shall be residents of the City of Redwood City interested in civic matters.

The Architectural Review Committee regularly meets on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month, but may hold additional meetings.

BOARD OF BUILDING REVIEW

The Board of Building Review, established by Ordinance 1381, consists of five members, appointed by the City Council for terms of four years each. Members serve without compensation and cannot hold any other public office or position in the City while serving as members of the Board. The Ordinance introduced at the December 16, 1996 Council Meeting changed the terms of Board members to commence June 1 and expire May 31 of even numbered years.

Special requirements exist regarding the qualifications of the Board of Building Review. These requirements are found in Section 2.120 of the City Code.

The basic duties and responsibilities of the Board of Building Review are as follows:

1. To review the updating of the City's building regulatory codes including suggested local amendments and provide recommendations to the City Council pertinent to the adoption of such codes (Section 2.124, City Code);
2. To determine the suitability of alternate materials and types of construction with respect to the requirements of Chapter 9 of the City Code (Section 2.125);
3. To hear appeals of persons denied a building permit, inspection approval or certificate of occupancy for the reason that the material or type of construction intended for use is not deemed to be in compliance with Chapter 9 of the City Code. Decisions of the Board in the case of such appeals are binding upon the Building Official (City Code, 2.126).

The Board of Building Review meets on the call of the chairperson, usually at the request of Building and Inspection.

CIVIC CULTURAL COMMISSION

The Civic Cultural Commission, established by Ordinance 1494, consists of seven members, appointed by the City Council for terms of four years each. Members, at the time of their appointment and continuously during their incumbency, reside within the City. Members also demonstrate a deep interest in, and appreciation of, artistic and cultural matters. Members serve without compensation and cannot hold any other public office or position in the City while serving as members of the Commission. Ordinance No. 2121 introduced at the December 16, 1996 Council Meeting changed the terms of Board members to commence June 1 and expire May 31 of even numbered years.

The qualifications for members of the Civic Cultural Commission are found in Section 2.110 of the City Code.

The powers and duties of the Civic Cultural Commission are found in Sec. 2.113 of the Code. Duties include recommendations to City Council or City Manager regarding:

1. The establishment of programs stimulating and encouraging the development and maintenance of the performing and visual arts in the City and to review periodically such programs as are so established;
2. The establishment of programs memorializing or giving recognition to matters of cultural significance in the City and to review periodically such programs as are so established;
3. The removal, relocation, or alteration of existing works of art or items of cultural significance in the possession of the city;
4. The acquisition by the City of any work of art or item of cultural significance and the proposed location thereof;
5. The aesthetics of the design and site development of any building, monument, or other structure to be constructed or acquired by the City;
6. Any matter affecting the beauty and culture of the City.

The Civic Cultural Commission regularly meets on the first Thursday of every month, but may hold additional meetings.

HOME IMPROVEMENT LOAN COMMITTEE

THE FEDERAL HOUSING AND COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT ACT OF 1974

Using money from federal grants, the City Council of Redwood City has authorized a program of home improvement and assistance with free counseling and low interest loans to qualified home owners in certain areas. The goal of the program is to improve housing and neighborhood conditions.

Rehabilitation not only involves cleanup, fix-up and paint-up activities, but major work to make structures more safe and comfortable such as the installation of up-to-date electrical, mechanical and plumbing equipment. The result is improved housing, more attractive neighborhoods and a halt in the deterioration of older homes.

Following inspections of qualified homes, a report will be provided on repairs needed and estimated cost. Housing improvement advisors will assist applicants to complete the necessary paperwork and select reputable contractors. Inspections will be made to insure the quality of the work.

The duty of the Loan Committee will be to receive applications after they have been prepared and processed by the Housing Improvement Advisor, and consider the following general issues:

- Does the credit information and data support the applicant's ability to assume the loan requested?
- Should the loan be amortized, and if so, for what term, and amount of monthly payments?
- Should the loan be deferred, and if so, for what term, and the amount of interest?
- Other collateral issues which are presented by individual situations and needs.
- Review any defaults in loan payments and determine appropriate course of action.

The Committee shall consist of one City Council member (non-voting); one City staff member (non-voting); one Housing & Human Concerns member; and six members being appointed, with recognition of persons having particular experience in or knowledge of banking, lending, title insurance and general contracting.

HOUSING AND HUMAN CONCERNS COMMITTEE

The Housing and Human Concerns Committee was established by City Council action on December 12, 1977, and reconfigured on January 16, 1995. The Committee is the successor of the Housing Concerns Committee, created in 1971, but has a wider scope of responsibilities than the former committee. On January 30, 1995, Council approved Minute Order 95-025 establishing nine 4-year staggered terms. On December 16, 1996, Council approved terms commencing June 1 and expiring May 31 of even numbered years.

The Committee's goal is to advocate the improvement of the quality of life of Redwood City citizens and to assure that human considerations, as set forth in the General Plan, are given adequate consideration in physical and economic decision making. The goal will be achieved through the collective leadership of the Committee in generating improved service and appropriate policy in those agencies responsible for social services. Further impact may be had by encouraging social responsiveness in legislation, zoning, police powers and recreation programs.

AREAS OF RESPONSIBILITIES

1. Monitor changing social needs within the community and make recommendations for improved, changed and/or new services.
2. Promote community awareness of social problems existing within Redwood City.
3. Coordinate human service activities within the community.
4. Promote adequate housing for all persons.
5. Advocate housing selection by location, type, price, and tenure, and a free choice of housing for all citizens.
6. Monitor and recommend changes, when necessary, in the housing element and the human services element of the General Plan.
7. Develop and recommend community development block grant programs and strategies.
8. Serve as the citizen participation vehicle for the Community Development Block Grant Program Application Process and Human Services Financial Assistance Funds Consolidated Plan to assure citizen input in the determination of use of those funds.

The nine voting members shall be residents and electors of the City who have demonstrated an interest in, and a commitment to, the objectives and purposes of the Committee; provided that no more than two such members may be residents of the unincorporated area of the County of San Mateo within the City's Planning Sphere of Influence or in the vicinity thereof.

LIBRARY BOARD

The Library Board consists of five members, appointed by the City Council for terms of four years each. Resolution No. 14823, passed by the voters as Measure “E” on November 6, 2007, specified that sections of the City Charter be amended to extend the term of office of City Library board members from three (3) to four (4) years. The new terms of office will come into effect for all subsequent appointees. Members shall be residents and electors of the city at the time of their appointments and continuously during their incumbencies. Members serve without compensation and cannot hold any other office or position in the City while serving as members of the Board.

The duties and responsibilities of the Library Board, as prescribed in Sections 18 through 20 of the City Charter, are as follows:

1. To establish rules for its proceedings, appoint, discipline and remove, subject to civil service provisions, such officers and employees as may be provided for by the Council and exercise all authority and perform all duties prescribed by this Charter or by ordinance;
2. To control and manage the public library system of the City;
3. To expend for library purposes all moneys in the Library Fund;
4. To make and enforce rules and regulations necessary for the administration, government and protection of the library system;
5. To purchase necessary books, journals, publications, and other personal property;
6. To borrow books from, rent books to, and exchange the same with other libraries and to extend library privileges to non-residents upon such conditions as the Board may prescribe;
7. To appoint and remove at its pleasure a librarian who shall be the chief executive officer of the public library system.

Also the Library Board shall furnish to the City Manager, prior to the third Monday in April of each year, a proposed budget in a form prescribed by the City Manager. The Council shall have the power to modify or alter such budget in any respect.

PARK, RECREATION, AND COMMUNITY SERVICES COMMISSION

The Park, Recreation, and Community Services Commission consists of seven members, appointed by the City Council for terms of four years each. Ordinance No. 2121 introduced at the December 16, 1996 Council Meeting changed the terms of members to commence June 1 and expire May 31 of even numbered years. Ordinance No. 2307 adopted at the May 8, 2007 City Council meeting changed the name of the commission from Park and Recreation Commission to Park, Recreation, and Community Services Commission.

The City Council, upon adopting the concept of an advisory recreation park commission, designated the following general duties and responsibilities of the Commission:

1. Act in an advisory capacity to the City Council in policy matters pertaining to the acquisition and development of parks and the formulation of a recreation program to meet the needs of the citizens;
2. Periodically review and make recommendations on the recreation and parks element of the City General Plan;
3. Actively promote recreation and park activities within the City;
4. Review and make recommendations to the City Council on the City Manager's annual proposed budget for recreation and parks from a pure policy standpoint, pertaining only to programs, levels of service, and capital improvements.

The Park and Recreation Commission meets regularly on the fourth Wednesday of each month and may meet in additional special sessions.

The Planning Commission consists of seven members, appointed by the City Council for terms of four years each. Resolution No. 14823, passed by the voters as Measure "E" on November 6, 2007, specified that sections of the City Charter be amended to extend the term of office of City Planning board members from three (3) to four (4) years. The new terms of office will come into effect for all subsequent appointees. Members serve without compensation and cannot hold any other public office or position in the City while serving as members of the Commission.

Duties and responsibilities of the Planning Commission are:

1. To exercise all powers and duties granted to it by ordinance or resolution of the City Council;
2. To recommend to the City Council, for adoption, a comprehensive long-term general plan for the physical development of the City;
3. To exercise such additional powers and duties as may be provided for by such general laws of the State of California as are not in conflict with local procedures.

The Commission also plays a role in the administration of the City Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Ordinance.

The Commission reviews and acts upon the following:

1. General Plan and General Plan amendments.
2. Neighborhood and specific area plans.
3. Environmental impact reports and negative declarations.
4. Tentative subdivision maps.
5. Planned Development permits applications for developments of one acre or more.
6. Appeals from actions taken by the Planning Director or the Sub-division Committee regarding applications for minor subdivisions.
7. Subdivision Ordinance exceptions.
8. Zoning and Subdivision Ordinance amendments.
9. Special studies and reports.

The Commission regularly meets on the first and third Tuesday of each month, but may hold additional meetings.

BOARD OF PORT COMMISSIONERS

The Board of Port Commissioners consists of five members, appointed by the City Council for terms of four years each. Resolution No. 14823, passed by the voters as Measure “E” on November 6, 2007, specified that sections of the City Charter be amended to reduce the term of office of City Port board members from five (5) years to (4) years. The new terms of office will come into effect for all subsequent appointees. Members must be residents and electors of the city at the time of their appointments and continuously during their incumbencies. Additionally, members must have been a resident and elector of the City for at least 3 years prior to their appointment. Members serve without compensation and cannot hold any other public office or position in the City while serving as members of the Commission.

The duties and responsibilities of the Board of Port Commissioners are prescribed in Section 47 through 50a of the City Charter.

Port Commissioners are assigned exclusive control and management of the Port, including the right to adopt and enforce such ordinances, orders, regulations and practices for proper administration as necessary for the management and government of the Port and its facilities.

The Port Commissioners are responsible for:

1. Supervision and control of the Port area, waterfront properties and adjacent lands and Redwood City Marina;
2. Provision for the needs of commerce, shipping and navigation at the Port;
3. Development, construction, re-construction, alteration, repairs, maintenance, equipping and operating all waterfront properties.
4. Regulation and control of all public service and public utilities operated in connection with the Port;
5. Fixing of all rates, dockage, rental, tolls, wharfage and related charges for the use and occupation of the public facilities and services of the Port, and providing for collection thereof.

The Charter also fixes responsibility upon the Port Commissioners to prepare an annual budget, levy tax funds with approval of the City Council, and authorize bond indebtedness for Port purposes.

The Board of Port Commissioners meets on the second and fourth Wednesday of each month and may meet in additional special sessions.

SCOPE

The general objectives of the Senior Affairs Commission shall be to encourage, foster, facilitate, establish and maintain programs for the enhancement of all matters relating to the social, economic, and personal well being of the City's senior population.

Its duties and responsibilities shall be:

1. To recommend to the Council or Manager the establishment of programs, stimulating and encouraging the development and maintenance of senior programs and services in the City, and to review periodically such programs as are so established.
2. To review and make recommendations to the Council and Manager regarding the funding of senior programs and services that operate within the City for the benefit of the City's senior population.
3. Upon request therefore, to advise the Council and other boards and commissions of the City regarding any matter affecting the City's senior citizen population.

HISTORIC RESOURCES ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Historic Resources Advisory Committee (H.R.A.C.) consists of seven members, one of whom is a Planning Commissioner appointed for a term of one year, the remaining six members being appointed by the Planning Commission for terms of three years. The H.R.A.C. was established by Ordinance No. 1815 effective March 10, 1980 with no term being set for members, and amended by Ordinance No. 1923 January 6, 1986 to establish terms of office.

Its purpose is to advocate the preservation and appropriate rehabilitation of historically significant properties and structures as set forth in the Historic Resources Element of the General Plan. The key duty of the H.R.A.C. is to make recommendations to the Planning Commission, which relate to the City's Historic Preservation Ordinance; and include the following goals:

1. Safeguard the City's heritage by providing for the protection of landmarks representing significant elements of its history.
2. Encourage public knowledge, understanding, and appreciation of Redwood City's role in local and regional history.
3. Foster civic and neighborhood pride and a sense of identity based on the recognition and use of historic and cultural resources.
4. Promote the enjoyment and use of historic and cultural resources appropriate for the education and recreation of the citizenry.
5. Strengthen the economy of the City by protecting and enhancing the City's historical features for residents, visitors and tourists.

COUNCIL APPOINTED OFFICERS

CITY MANAGER (Charter Section 26)

The City Manager is the administrative head of the City government. The Manager implements all Council policy decisions and appoints City department heads with the exception of the City Clerk and City Attorney who are appointed by the City Council, and the City Librarian and Port Manager who are appointed by their respective boards. The City Manager supervises the development of the proposed budget and submits it to the Council, supervises department operations, is responsible for enforcement of City ordinances, and advises the Council as to the needs of the City.

The City Manager may take part in discussion of matters coming before the Council, but has no vote.

CITY CLERK (Charter Section 32)

The Clerk attends all Council meetings, Redevelopment Agency meetings, Board of Equalization meetings and any special Council meetings, sends out the notices, prepares the Agenda and records the proceedings. The Clerk administers oaths and affirmations, manages the City's official records, prepares certain documents for filing with the County, certifies affidavits, keeps the official seal, conducts municipal elections, and is the filing official and officer for the Fair Political Practices Commission. The Clerk keeps informed on all matters before the City Council and provides information to the public and staff.

CITY ATTORNEY (Charter Section 44)

The City Attorney is the legal advisor to the Council, the Redevelopment Agency and the Port of Redwood City, and other City officials on municipal matters.

The office of the City Attorney drafts ordinances, resolutions, contracts and agreements and approves as to form deeds, bonds and forms relating to City business. The Attorney's office defends and prosecutes cases on behalf of the City and prosecutes violations of the City's ordinances.

REGISTER TO VOTE

You may register by mailing a completed Voter Registration Form, to the Elections office. Forms are available in person at City Clerk offices, public libraries, city and county offices, California Department of Motor Vehicles offices, and at U.S. Post Offices, or via on-line download. You may also call the Election office at (650) 312-5222 and they will mail a form to you within one business day. To complete the Voter Registration form on-line go to http://www.sos.ca.gov/elections/elections_vr.htm. You may register at any time, but to be eligible to vote in an upcoming election, your Voter Registration Form must be postmarked no later than 15 days before that election.

VOTER QUALIFICATIONS

You may register to vote if you meet all of the following requirements:

- Citizen of the United States
- Resident of California
- At least 18 years of age on or before election day
- Not in prison or on parole for the conviction of a felony.

If you move, change your name, or change your political party affiliation, you will need to re-register.

Once your Voter Registration Form is received and processed by the County Elections Office, they will send you a Voter Notification Card within 3-4 weeks, indicating you that you are now a registered voter. You can also check your eligibility at the County Elections Office website, http://www.shapethefuture.org/voters/voter_status.asp, or call them directly at (650) 312-5222.

VOTE BY MAIL BALLOT REQUESTS

You may apply up to seven days before an election for a “Vote by Mail” application once or permanently by filling out and submitting the proper online form at <http://www.shapethefuture.org/absentee/default.asp>. Or, you may download the Vote by Mail ballot application form, fill it out, and mail, deliver or fax it to the Elections Office. You may register at any time, but to be eligible to vote in an upcoming election, your Voter Registration Form must be postmarked no later than 15 days before that election.

VOTER REGISTRATION INFORMATION - Continued

PERMANENT VOTE BY MAIL STATUS

Effective January 1, 2002, California's Election Law now allows any registered voter, who so requests, to become a Permanent Vote by Mail Voter (Chapter 922, AB 1520, 2001 Statutes). To become a Permanent Vote by Mail Voter, please download and print the application form online at <http://www.shapethefuture.org/votingoptions/documents/permvotebymailapp.pdf> (note - you will need Adobe Acrobat Reader available for free at <http://www.adobe.com>), complete, sign, and mail or fax it to the San Mateo County Elections Office at Registration & Elections Division, 40 Tower Road, San Mateo, CA 94402, Attention: Vote by Mail Unit, Fax: (650) 312-5348.

Once enrolled as a Permanent Vote by Mail Voter, you will automatically be mailed an official Vote by Mail ballot and all election materials within 20 days before an election. You will no longer need to apply for a Vote by Mail ballot each election. Failure to vote in a statewide election, however, will cancel your Permanent Vote by Mail Voter status, but will not affect your active voter registration status. If you fail to vote in a statewide election, you will need to re-apply for permanent Vote by Mail status.
